

QuickSteps: Creating a Credit Slide

In this QuickStep tutorial, we will address how to cite images, video, audio, and other media appropriately in a slideshow.

There are several thoughts about appropriate places to place citations. When you are adding images to the Internet (on a blog page or wiki), the citation goes beneath the image.

However, you are creating an eBook. Placing citations directly underneath the images/media in a story distracts the reader from the message being delivered. Do not place the citations within the story. Just think of the illustrator's name appearing right below the pictures of a picture book!

Therefore, these citations must appear in a separate slide, or a CREDITS/BIBLIOGRAPHY slide. Be sure you have a citation for each image, video, and audio in your slideshow.

Log in to your account in SlideRocket and click on the name of your presentation (**My TPACK Journey**) in the DASHBOARD.

Step 1: Create a new slide. (The process is to click on the NEW button and a new slide displays in the workspace window). This slide will be the END SLIDE and hold the citations for your media used in your TPACK Journey ebook.

Step 2: Add the title for the new slide. Double-click in the heading textbox and type: CREDIT SLIDE

Step 3: Add a textbox and type in the citation information for the image acquired

Use the information below to properly create the citation entry for the image on your credit slide that you will build next:

Review the following citation formats for each media type that can be used in SlideRocket slideshow. Keep this information available as we work each week adding to the eBook.

Proper citation formats for each media item used in the Slideshow. Follow the rules for citing images, video, and audio included below.

IMAGES: Include the following information:

- The slide where the image appears
- Image creator's last name, first name, if available, or screen name, or page author's name if available, followed by a period and a space
- Date photo/image was created, in parentheses, followed by a period
- Title of photo, followed by a space. If no title, describe what the image is briefly within quotation marks.
- Descriptive word (photograph, map, cartoon, drawing, online image, etc,) in brackets followed by a period and a space.
- Retrieved from [URL of web address]

A correct citation will look something like this:

SLIDE 4: Figg, C., Jaipal, K., & Forsythe, J. (2011, April 7). TPCK Re-envisioned [Online image]. Retrieved from <http://flic.kr/p/a5JaoR>

A correct citation for your own personal images look like this:

SLIDE 4: Your Name. (©Year). Name of image [Type of image – photo, chart, drawing, etc.].

AUDIO: Include the following information:

- The slide where the image appears
- Audio creator's last name, first name, or screen name, followed by a period and a space
- Date audio was uploaded, in parentheses, followed by a period
- Title of audio, followed by a space. If no title, describe what the video is briefly.
- Descriptive word [Podcast] in brackets followed by a period and a space.
- Retrieved from [place the URL of the specific video – full URL, not a shortened version]

A correct citation will look something like this:

SLIDE 4: Figg, C. (2011, April 10). TPCK Re-envisioned [Podcast]. Retrieved from <http://flic.kr/p/a5JaoR>

VIDEO: Include the following information:

- The slide where the image appears
- Video creator's last name, first name, or screen name, followed by a period and a space
- Date video was uploaded, in parentheses, followed by a period
- Title of video, followed by a space. If no title, describe what the video is briefly.
- Descriptive word [Video] in brackets followed by a period and a space.
- Retrieved from [place the URL of the specific video – full URL, not a shortened version]

A correct citation will look something like this:

SLIDE 4: Figg, C. (2011, April 10). TPCK Re-envisioned [Video]. Retrieved from <http://flic.kr/p/a5JaoR>

Step 4: SAVE your slideshow using FILE>SAVE from the command menu.
