

CITE IT RIGHT!

Citing images is copyright law, so it is required for your Internet assignments.

INTERNET IMAGES – like your Edublog and Digital Portfolio pages!

When citing images on the Internet, the citation should appear directly below the image. We will use APA format. Common usage for APA formatting at this time is to include the following if it is available (If not available, provide as much information as possible):

- Image creator's last name, first name, if available, or screen name, or page author's name if available, followed by a period and a space
- Date photo/image was created, in parentheses, followed by a period
- Title of photo, followed by a space. If no title, describe what the image is briefly within quotation marks.
- Descriptive word (photograph, map, cartoon, drawing, online image, etc,) in brackets followed by a period and a space.
- Retrieved from [URL of web address]

This information should be placed directly under any image you place on the Internet (use the caption feature to do this!)– see the examples below:

You should also cite ALL images including YOUR original works and photos – those are copyrighted, too – you hold the copyright! If the image you use on your edublog is your OWN photo, then place the © symbol, followed by the year and your name beneath the photo.

If you feel the URL is too long and cumbersome and distracts from the appearance of your message, you can shorten the URL using a tool like <http://bit.ly>! Images that are permissible to use with attribution CC (means it can be used with citing) can be found at <http://search.creativecommons.org/> (look under Google image or Flickr image buttons). Other copyright-friendly resources can be found on Handy4class.com!

CITING IN PRESENTATIONS (like your SlideRocket or a PowerPoint presentation)

Citations for images used in a slideshow are NOT placed directly beneath the images because it distracts from the storyline being read by the reader. Citations for ALL multimedia is placed in a separate slide at the end of the presentation. Images, audio clips, and video clips embedded in the slideshow must be cited. A correct citation will look something like this

Slide where the multimedia appears: Authors last name, first initial. (Date). Name of multimedia [type of multimedia]. Retrieved from URL (IF retrieved from online and not personally owned)

OR
